A return to face-to-face

In the last year, we saw a return to CASA volunteers being sworn in at the courthouse, something I am thrilled about. We also saw a return to in-person volunteer information sessions and volunteer training.

We returned to hosting our annual gala at Preakness Hills Country Club, held our first ever pickleball tournament, and recently, had our most successful tricky tray ever!

In an effort to provide a sense of normalcy throughout the year, we held back-to-school drives, collecting backpacks and school supplies for children in foster care, held winter coat drives, and held our annual holiday gift drive, to make sure that every child with a CASA received a gift that they wanted during the winter holidays.

to show our appreciation for the service and dedication of our CASA volunteers.

Growth and expansion

Throughout the year, staff attended many professional development opportunities, including the Annual San Diego International Conference on Child and Family Maltreatment, and the CASA/GAL National Conference in St. Louis, bringing back perspectives and learning to Passaic County that benefit our children and help improve our processes and approach.

We welcomed into our physical office the START program, which provides specialized mental health recovery care in conjunction with the NJ Safe Babies Court Team.

We have played a critical role in supporting our fellow CASA program in Union County to ensure the highest quality of advocacy services for children, during an organizational transition.

We took on new space and expanded our office to ensure we are primed for success as we look to grow the services we offer moving forward.

In the last year, we were successful in keeping our wait list of children at zero. Every child that needed a CASA, was assigned a CASA. We could not have done this without your support, and I am truly grateful.

PROGRAMS

Passaic County CASA operates three distinct but complimentary programs:

The Court Appointed Special Advocacy program,
the NJ Safe Babies Court Team program, and the Open Door Store.







Court Appointed Special Advocates

Children who have been abused and/ or neglected, and have been placed into foster care need more than the child welfare, court systems and education systems can provide. Court Appointed Special Advocates bridge the gap.

Through the Court Appointed Special Advocacy program, Passaic County CASA recruits, screens, trains, and supervises volunteer advocates from the local community who champion the best interests of children in the child welfare system. These advocates focus on the individual needs of each child and advocate for those interests throughout the legal and child welfare process.

New Jersey Safe Babies Court Team

In 2020, Passaic County CASA was chosen to be the host organization for a new Safe Babies Court Team (SBCT) program in New Jersey. Operating in Passaic, Hudson, and Essex counties, the New Jersey Safe Babies Court Team (NISBCT) provides evidence-based and hands-on support to infants and toddlers age 0-3 and their families in the court system. NJSBCT works to improve outcomes for very young children in foster care, or at risk for removal. The team is focused on minimizing trauma and its impact on early development by improving collaboration between the judicial and child welfare systems.

The Open Door Store

What began as a response to the economic effects of COVID-19 pandemic and the needs of vulnerable children and families, has grown to become a fully-fledged resource providing those in need with necessities like diapers, wipes, formula, as well as clothing, shoes, and accessories.

Children and teens in the child welfare system, their caretakers, and their Advocates can 'shop' for free – no money is ever accepted. The Open Door Store gives children in foster care the opportunity to pick new clothing out for themselves, and fosters a sense of 'normalcy' for children who have experienced tremendous turmoil in their lives.







What is a CASA?

Not sure what a CASA is? You might already know one and not even know it!

like you.

CASA, or a Court Appointed Special Advocate, is a volunteer that works with children who have been removed from their homes due to abuse, neglect, or abandonment.

CASA volunteers are fully trained

Each CASA volunteer undertakes an the ju intensive 36-hour training course that covers the child welfare system, the needs and development of children, trauma, mental health, professional communication, cultural competence, and educational needs so that they are prepared to advocate for the best interests of a child, or children, living in foster care.

CASA volunteers are appointed by a family court judge

Once training is complete, CASA volunteers are sworn in by a family court judge and appointed to a child's case to ensure the child remains a priority in an overburdened child welfare system.

The CASA provides reports to the assigned judge so that he or she maintains an accurate and up-to-date understanding of the child and his or her case.

CASA volunteers form relationships

CASAs get to know the child while gathering information from their family, teachers, doctors, therapists, caregivers, and anyone else involved in the child's life. This is done to make independent and informed recommendations that help the judge decide what is in the child's best interest.

A CASA volunteer is not a foster parent or social worker

You do not need any special skills to be a CASA volunteer. You need the desire to help a child, have a valid driver's license, be at least 21 years old, have lived in the U.S. for five years, clear a background check, have basic computer skills,

time flexibility, and the ability to clearly communicate verbally and in writing.

A CASA volunteer is you

No volunteer will be rejected because of race, color, religious creed, national origin, sex, age, or marital status.

A CASA is a regular person just like you that simply has the best interests of children at heart.

What does a CASA do?

hen a family is in crisis and becomes involved in the child welfare system, a CASA volunteer may be appointed by a judge to advocate for the child. The highly trained volunteer is a community member whose responsibility is to get to know the child and their family, and advocate for the child's best interests, safety, permanency and well-being while in foster care.











Nate meets with David and provides a consistent presence while working with all parties involved on the case.



Together they identify David's physical, emotional and educational needs and resources to help him.

Nate meets with David every month and shares information with the judge at each court hearing.

Nate continues to advocate for David and stay by his side throughout the case, advocating for David's best interests and a path for permanency.

If reunification with his parents is not safe or possible, Nate will advocate for David to be adopted by, or live with, other relative or family friends. If that is also not possible, Nate will advocate for adoption by a non-relative.

Regardless of the outcome, Nate will keep in contact with David until the case closes so that everyone continues to put David's best interests first.



NJ Safe Babies Court Team CONNECTS

The New Jersey Safe Babies Court Team connects families, child caregivers and professionals. How do we know? Because they tell us.

When parents were asked what SBCT is good at, they said:

"Supporting reunification"

"Representing the best interest of your child"

"Advocating for you, support, being there if you need to help" "Everything"

"I'm grateful that safe babies was in my life, they help me a whole lot"

When child caregivers were asked what SBCT is good at, they said:

"Making sure we are good"

"Connecting the relevant parties in communication"

"Helping with the needs of the child and the person responsible for the care of the child"

"Communicating"

SBCT Professionals say:

"As a community provider, I find SBCT is the one team that holds the values and respects their clients in a similar fashion to our program. I cannot say enough positives about SBCT and wish all families could be connected to the team"

"Safe Babies coordinates all stakeholders so that everyone can be updated and priorities shared. Bio parents seem supported also." "The SBCT is very good at keeping records. By the SBCT scheduling monthly meeting it allows the court team to be on the same page before the hearings."



The Neighborhood Assistance Program and the OPEN DOOR STORE

From clothing to books, to toys and personal care items, sometimes the smallest items can make a real difference.

he Neighborhood Assistance Program went through a big evolution in the past 12 months, transforming from a COVID response helping families with diapers and formula, to something much, much more.

A year ago, with the support of Columbia Bank, Bloomingdale's and Macy's, we took an empty room at the back of the office, and transformed it into the Open Door Store.

Every first Saturday of the month by appointment, the Open Door Store opens its doors to CASA volunteers, as well as children and their caretakers in the child welfare system who have an appointed CASA advocate, to come in and shop for free, for new clothing, new shoes, toiletries and new accessories.

The Open Door Store has become the flagship of the Neighborhood Assistance Program, which continues to provide winter coats, diapers, holiday gifts, school supplies and backpacks.

Where the Court Appointed Special Advocacy program and the NJ Safe Babies Court Team are about people and relationships, the Neighborhood Assistance Program and Open Door Store are the material goods and stuff—and everyone needs stuff!



CASA Stories



nitra has been a CASA since November, 2022. When Anitra first met with her CASA child's biological mother, the mother had some items that she wanted to get to her son in his foster home – one of the

items being the child's favorite teddy bear. Anitra offered to pass the bear along to the child, and this offer helped break the ice with the biological mother.

Anitra took the bear, and used the opportunity to take various photos of the bear in different locations having shenanigans at school, at the library, eating cookies, brushing his teeth, reading a book, and many more. When Anitra first met

her CASA child, giving him the teddy and showing him pictures of the adventures the bear had was another excellent icebreaker. The child loved it!

Anitra has range of photos to send, and she texts them to the foster parents to maintain the relationship. The pictures of teddy give Anitra a unique way to connect with her CASA child, and to find out more about his well being - a picture of teddy at school opens the door to asking about how the child is doing at school, and so on. Anitra is looking forward to her next visit, as teddy picked out a book from the library, and Anitra will read it to her CASA child.

Every case is different and every child is unique. Anitra's ability to be creative and flexible in her approach to engaging with her CASA child has helped her develop a positive, trusting relationship – and that's what matters.



Persistence

Toby has been a CASA for 1 year. Toby's CASA child is a young man of 18, who has only been in the child welfare system for a year. Entering into care at a later age was a shock to the young man, and things with Toby started off difficult. The young man was depressed, wouldn't speak, kept his hood on, and would not make eye contact. Communication was not easy, but Toby was committed.

Months passed, and when the young man's birthday came up, Toby was able to get his CASA child gift cards for his birthday through Passaic County CASA's Neighborhood Assistance Program.

McDonald's gift cards were a success — when the boy saw them, it was the first time Toby saw him smile.

More months passed, with things still difficult, but Toby didn't give up. In November, a new winter coat from the Open Door Store started to break the ice. For Christmas, CASA was able to go above and beyond thanks to a special grant to give the boy a new computer. This opened up the relationship. "He was so happy, so ecstatic," says Toby.

Each month, Toby persisted. He would visit regularly and even made time to attend the boy's basketball games. Over the course of building the relationship with his CASA child, Toby went to 10 out of 20 basketball games. No one asked him to, he just went – to show his support – to make that connection. And it worked. The boy will be playing in a tournament game, and instead of Toby showing up on his own, the boy reached out to invite Toby, asking him to please attend. To forge a relationship takes persistence. Persistence pays off.



Expect the unexpected

Stefanie has been a CASA for 2 years. When she was given a case that would be advocating for an eight year old girl, Stefanie read all of the background materials in the case file to prepare herself for her first meeting with her CASA child. The background information didn't paint a great picture, and Stefanie expected the worst.

"The child had had a very unstable life since birth, so I was expecting doom and gloom, someone beaten down," says Stefanie, "you can form an impression from things in the report, but it was not like that at all."

Stefanie found that her CASA child was in fact very savvy and very confident, with lots of personality and lots of friends. They would play games like Spot-it together, and often the child would win, "She does beat me," says Stefanie, "I don't let her win, she wins!"

Stefanie has been reading with her CASA child, helping her with her reading level. Slowly, her reading is improving. Stefanie enjoys the advocating for an older child that she can communicate with. Stefanie says, "I definitely went in thinking the worst based on the report – but I was pleasantly surprised, it was not like I thought it would be!"

During our 2022-23 fiscal year, Passaic County CASA made an impact in the lives of children in foster care.



148 **ACTIVE VOLUNTEERS**

148 incredible individuals stepped up and said "I will speak up for a child". Every single one of them made a difference.

9,315 VOLUNTEER **HOURS**

Total volunteer hours entered through contact logs in our database was 9,315 hours. That's 380 days non-stop! Cases can last on average around 2 years, a significant time commitment.

292 **CHILDREN SERVED**

100% of children in Passaic County that needed a CASA, got a CASA. We are proud to have been able to meet every request for a CASA that we received.

2,254 RECOMMENDATIONS **MADE TO COURT**

CASA Volunteers wrote over 800 Court Reports, and made 2,254 recommendations — 92% of which were accepted and ordered by the Court.




